Access courses have been specifically designed for learners age 19 or over, who would like to study a Higher Education course.

They are ideal for students who have not studied for a long time but wish to return to education.



An Introduction to the Access Diploma

Access Diploma

Access courses have been specifically designed for learners aged 19 and over, who would like to study a Higher Education course. They are ideal for adults who have not studied for a long time but wish to return to education. Access courses give learners the skills as well as the qualifications they need to take their studies further. The courses are designed to enhance confidence and personal development and to enable learners to work independently at Higher Education level.

An Access course can be completed in one year as a full-time student; however, you can take the part-time option and complete the programme over two years. No formal qualifications are required to take an Access course, although after initial enquiry learners are invited to a group interview/information session during which basic English and Maths levels will be assessed. This is to ensure that prospective learners are working at around Level 2 (GCSE level) at the start of the learners' course. Successful completion of an Access course means that you can apply to study at university. Access courses are available at our main Dunstable College campus and also at The Learning Warehouse Leighton-Linsdale in Leighton Buzzard. The awarding body is Open College Network Oxford Thames Chiltern (OCNOTC).

Essential information

Access Diplomas are arranged in a modular system which gives you the flexibility to build up your own programme to suit your individual needs.

The College offers 8 pathways:

- Nursing, Midwifery and Medically Allied Professions (Radiography, Physiotherapy, Occupational Therapy, Audiology etc)
- Teacher Education (leading to ITT Education Degree)
- Social Work
- Humanities and Social Sciences
- Psychology
- Law
- Business Studies and Marketing
- Computing.

To successfully complete all pathways except for Nursing, Midwifery and Medically Allied Professions, you will need to achieve 60 credits, of which 45 must be at Level 3 (A level standard). Please check with the university of your choice concerning the number of credits they require for a particular course, as some may require more than the minimum number stated here.

Timetables

As the Access programme is modular, you will be responsible for creating your own timetable. This will be done during induction. Most classes are held between 0930 and 1515.

The courses comprise core and optional modules. All core modules are offered at least three times per week and optional modules offered twice per week. Part-time learners have the opportunity to attend during the day, the evening or a combination of both.

Entry requirements

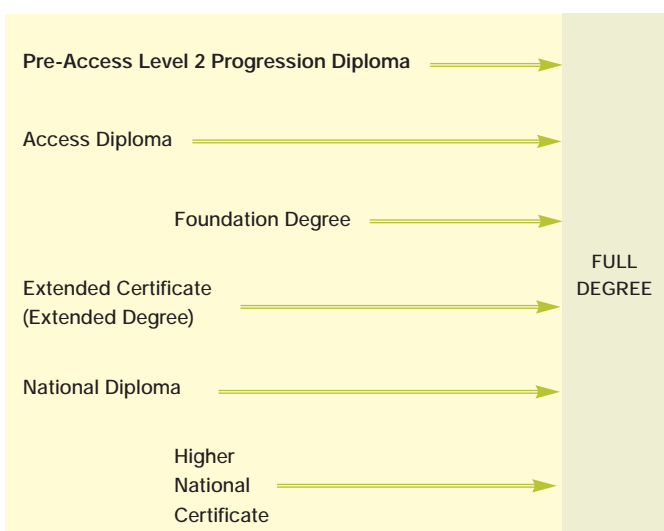
- You must be at least 19 years of age or over
- Level 2 literacy skills
- Level 1 numeracy skills.

Access Level 2 Progression Diploma courses have been designed for students who are preparing for the full Access course.

Business Studies and Marketing

22106 07 Access Diploma to Higher Education in Business Studies and Marketing (OCNOTC)

This course is aimed at those who wish to undertake a university degree in Business Studies. This course enables you to "return to learn" in a supportive environment.

You will develop core skills in communication, numeracy and IT.

Core modules are:

Communication

- Reading and Writing
- Speaking and Listening

Application of Number

- Interpreting and Presenting Information
- Calculations

Information Technology

- Planning Research on the Internet
- Research Skills

Optional Modules are:

- Economics
- Finance
- Marketing
- Business Administration
- Law.

Additional modules may also be available.

Modules in Maths, English Language and Science will be also be available for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical exercises and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, of which at least 45 must be at Level 3.

No formal qualifications are required but you should be able to demonstrate competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to year 1 of your chosen degree. You may apply to the university of your choice via UCAS.

If you change your mind about taking a business degree and wish to take an alternative course, provided the Access Diploma has been obtained, other degree courses will be open to you.

Computing

22107 07 Access Diploma to Higher Education in Computing (OCNOTC)

This course is aimed at those who wish to become a computer professional. The course enables you to "return to learn" in a supportive environment. It will help enhance your confidence and those study skills required at a Higher Education level.

This course contains core and optional modules.

Core modules are:

- Application of Number
- Communication Skills
- IT
- Research Module

Note: These core modules must be passed with a minimum of Level 2 for Application of Number, Communication Skills and IT and Level 3 for the Research Module.

Optional modules are:

- History of Computing
- Introduction to Software Design
- Programming Specifications
- Introduction to Programming
- Practical Programming
- Human Computer Interface
- Social Aspects of Computing
- Computer Arithmetic
- Computer Functions
- Computer Architecture.

Modules in Maths and English Language will also be available for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical assessments and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, 45 of which must be achieved at Level 3. Where more credits are achieved, then 75% should be at Level 3. No formal qualifications are required, but you should be able to demonstrate a competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to a Foundation Degree in Computing or to university for an Honours Degree.

If you do not wish to proceed immediately to university you may receive an Access Diploma, which can be used with prospective employers or other Higher Education establishments.



Humanities and Social Science

22108 07 Access Diploma in Humanities and Social Science (OCNOTC)

This course is ideal for those who wish to study at university for a conventional degree. It is usually a popular choice for learners who are interested in studying Sociology, Psychology, Law and History. This course enables you to "return to learn" in a supportive environment.

This course contains core and optional modules.

Core modules are:

Communication

- Reading and Writing
- Speaking and Listening

Application of Number

- Interpreting and Presenting Information
- Calculations

Information Technology

- Planning Research on the Internet
- Research Skills

Optional Modules

You may select your modules from those offered on the other Access courses.

Modules in Maths, English Language and Science will also be available for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical assessments and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits of which at least 45 credits must be at Level 3. In addition, if you do not have Grade C or above in GCSE Maths and/or English, you will have an option to take further credits in these subjects to achieve the full GCSE equivalence.

No formal qualifications are required, but you should be able to demonstrate competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to year 1 of your chosen degree. You may apply to the university of your choice via UCAS.



Law

22109 07 Access Diploma to Higher Education in Law (OCNOTC)

This course is aimed at those who wish to undertake a university degree in Law. This course enables you to "return to learn" in a supportive environment.

You will develop core skills in communication, numeracy and IT.

Core modules are:

Communication

- Reading and Writing
- Speaking and Listening

Application of Number

- Interpreting and Presenting information
- Calculations

Information Technology

- Planning Research on the Internet
- Research Skills

Optional Modules are:

- Sources of Common Law
- The English Legal System

- Criminal Law - Assault and Murder
- Participation in the Law
- Culture and Social Differentiation
- Social Policy and Sociology.

Additional modules may also be available in Maths, English Language and Science for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical exercises and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, of which at least 45 must be at Level 3.

No formal qualifications are required but you should be able to demonstrate competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to year 1 of your chosen degree. A number of our students recently progressed to studying at the Universities of Bedfordshire, Durham and Chester.



Nursing, Midwifery and Medically Allied Professions

22110 07 Access Diploma in Nursing, Midwifery and Medically Allied Professions (OCNOTC)

This course is aimed at those who wish to specialise in Nursing, Midwifery, Audiology, Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy etc.

It covers a broad range of subjects relating to medical fields. The course will enhance your confidence and those study skills required at a Higher Education level.

This course contains core and optional modules.

Core modules are:

- Communication Skills
- IT
- Numeracy and Research Project

Optional modules are:

- Human Biology
- Sociology
- Psychology
- Health Policy.

This course blends theoretical and practical work. Additional modules may also be available. Modules in Maths and English Language will also be available for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical assessments and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, 51 of which must be at Level 3. You must achieve Human Biology at Level 3.

No formal qualifications are required, but you should be able to demonstrate a competency in English and Numeracy. You should be aged 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to a three-year health and social care related degree course, to a more general degree course, or to nurse training or midwifery.

If you do not wish to proceed immediately to university you may receive an Access Diploma, which is valued by prospective employers or other Higher Education establishments.



Psychology

22111 07 Access Diploma to Higher Education in Psychology (OCNOTC)

This course is aimed at those who wish to undertake a university degree in Psychology but do not have the entry requirements to do so. This course enables you to "return to learn" in a supportive environment.

You will develop core skills in communication, numeracy and IT.

Core modules are:

- Communication
- Reading and Writing
 - Speaking and Listening

- Application of Number
- Interpreting and Presenting information
 - Calculations

- Information Technology
- Planning Research on the Internet
 - Research Skills

Optional Modules are:

- Theoretical approaches to Psychology
- Abnormal Psychology
- Ethical issues in Psychology
- Memory.

Note:

This pathway will also include some Sociology units to allow comparison and contrast between the two social sciences and also to allow for the rigorous study of research methodology.

Additional modules may also be available in Maths, English Language and Science for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical exercises and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, of which at least 45 must be at Level 3.

No formal qualifications are required but you should be able to demonstrate competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to year 1 of your chosen degree. A number of our recent students progressed to studying at the University of Bedfordshire.



Social Work

22112 07 Access Diploma to Higher Education in Social Work (OCNOTC)

You will develop core skills in communication, numeracy and IT.

Additional modules may also be available in Maths, English Language and Science for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical exercises and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, of which at least 45 must be at Level 3.

No formal qualifications are required but you should be able to demonstrate competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to year 1 of your chosen degree. Previous successful students have progressed to the University of Bedfordshire.



Teacher Education

22113 07 Access Diploma to Higher Education in Teacher Education (OCNOTC)

This course is aimed at those who wish to become school teachers. This course has the aim of enabling you to “return to learn” in a supportive environment. You will develop the skills you need to undertake a Bachelor of Education Degree.

The course contains core and optional modules.

Core modules are:

Communication

- Reading and Writing
- Speaking and Listening

Application of Number

- Interpreting and Presenting Information
- Calculations

Information Technology

- Planning Research on the Internet
- Research Skills

Optional modules are:

- Human Biology
- English Literature
- School Placement
- History.

Additional modules may also be available in Maths, English Language and Science, for those without the necessary GCSEs.

There will be continuous assessment through assignments, reports, practical exercises, a placement journal and there will be examinations.

To gain the Access Diploma you must achieve a minimum of 60 credits, of which at least 45 must be at Level 3.

No formal qualifications are required, but you must be working at Level 2 at the start of the course. You should be able to demonstrate competency in English and Numeracy. You should be 19 or over.

Next Step

Successful completion of this course will enable you to progress to year 1 of a BEd degree. Previous successful students have completed their initial teacher training at the Universities of Bedfordshire and Hertfordshire.

You may apply to the university of your choice via UCAS. If you change your mind about teaching and wish to take an alternative degree, provided the Access Diploma has been obtained, other degree courses will be open to you.
